Background

- In September of 2022 the Metropolitan Football Stadium District (MFSD) notified the City and County of Broomfield that we were receiving \$1,096,818.44 from the sale of the Denver Broncos Football Club.
 - Broomfield is one of many MFSD cities/counties in which a sales tax was charged from January of 2001 and ending 2011.
 - MFSD requires that these funds are to be used on <u>YOUTH</u> <u>ACTIVITY</u> programs.
 - We are expected to provide an accounting in September, 2023 on how the funds have benefitted Youth Activities Programs in Broomfield. There is no timeframe on when all funds must be spent.
- A staff workgroup comprised of representatives from several Broomfield departments, in partnership with the Broomfield youth, worked on a number of ideas and initiatives.
- Input was received from Broomfield Youth for Youth (Y4Y),
 Broomfield Teen Council, and the Broomfield Library Teen
 Ambassador Board.
- Our initial proposal was presented to City Council on February 28, 2023.
